## Opportunities for Parental Involvement (School Year 2007-08)

Parents and community members play an integral role at Ione Elementary. Every day, parents sign in at the school office and go to classrooms to work as volunteers. They tutor students, run the Home Library classroom program, make presentations, teach music, prepare materials, help at Game Day, and chaperone field trips. Without parent volunteers, our school would not be able to offer the rich services and support to students that we count on.

Parents make up one half of the SSC, the governing body of our school. The council surveys parents, monitors the educational program, helps to set annual goals, and approves the budget for spending for specific purposes. Our PFC raises money and plans activities that directly benefit all students. The PFC is extraordinary in its support of students and teachers. Within this school year, it is sponsoring a not-for-profit holiday gift shop and a school carnival as well as providing field trip transportation and funds for numerous classroom projects. PFC also reinstated two hours of librarian time for the entire school year when that time was lost through budget cuts.

#### School Safety Plan (School Year 2007-08)

We constantly monitor the school grounds and entrance points to maximize school safety. Staff is on campus to supervise students 35 minutes before school begins. A traffic officer helps to direct traffic and cross students safely at the school's entrance. From the first day of school, teachers review behavior expectations and school rules. The rules are periodically reviewed in the classroom and in grade-level Principal Chats. These chats allow the principal to talk with students about school safety, bullying, dangerous objects, responsibility, and behavior.

Visitors to the school must sign in at the school office and wear visitor stickers.

The school holds regular fire, earthquake, and lockdown drills. The drills vary the scenarios of potential emergencies so that staff members can keep students and themselves safe in unforeseen circumstances.

The state of California is the primary source of district funding. The district receives funds for basic operations such as salaries, books, school supplies, copiers, and repairs based on school attendance figures. Student absences, regardless of the reason, seriously affect our school budget.

The SSC discusses and approves state and federal fund expenditures according to a budget that is approved each spring.

#### California State University

Admission requirements for the California State University (CSU) use three factors to determine eligibility. They are specific high school courses; grades in specified courses and test scores; and graduation from high school. Some campuses have higher standards for particular majors or students who live outside the local campus area. Because of the number of students who apply, a few campuses have higher standards (supplementary admission criteria) for all applicants. Most CSU campuses utilize local admission guarantee policies for students who graduate or transfer from high schools and colleges that are historically served by a CSU campus in that region.
