Who?

- Students in grades 5, 7, 9, 11
- Positive permission required for Grade 5
- All Students in Grades 7, 9, 11 take it unless parent opts out

2018 to 2019 ACUSD Growth

High School Growth

School Engagement and Supports (11th grade)

- School connectedness (58% to 59%)
- Academic motivation (60% to 70%)
- Chronic truancy (16% to 6%)
- Caring adult relationships (65% to 67%)
- High expectations (71% to 74%)
- Parent involvement in school (42% to 46%)

High School Growth

School Safety

- School perceived as safe or very safe (53% to 60% for 9th and 56% to 63% for 11th grade)
- Experienced any harassment or bullying (44% to 35% 11th)
- Been in a physical fight (15% to 10% for 9th and 9% to 8% for 11th grade)
- Seen a weapon on campus (22% to 18% for 9th and 25% to 13% for 11th grade)

High School Growth

Substance use Decline

- Current alcohol or drug use (27% to 22% for 9th and 41% to 32% for 11th grade)
- Current marijuana use (17% to 14% for 9th and 27% to 22% for 11th grade)
- Current binge drinking (8% to 7% for 9th and 17% to 14% for 11th grade)

Middle School Growth

School Engagement and Supports

- School connectedness (52% to 54%)
- Caring adult relationships (53% to 60%)
- High expectations (70% to 72%)
- Parent involvement in school (40% to 48%)

Middle School Growth

School Safety

- School perceived as safe or very safe (47% to 58%)
- Experienced any harassment or bullying (51% to 43%)
- Been in a physical fight (24% to 19%)
- Saw a weapon on campus (21% to 16%)

Middle School Growth

Overall low substance use

- Stayed steady, but low rates

Elementary School Growth

School Engagement and Supports

- School connectedness (73% to 74%)
- Meaningful participation (40% to 41%)
- Anti-bullying climate (71% to 72%)

Elementary School Growth

School Safety Improvements

- Feel safe at school (81% to 82%)
- Violence victimization (54% to 52%)
- Been hit or pushed (51% to 46%)
- Mean rumors spread (56% to 50%)

Elementary School Growth

School Disciplinary Environment

- Students well behaved (41% to 42%)
- Treated fairly when break rules (42% to 59%)
- Students treated with respect (81% to 82%)

ACUSD Opportunities for Improvement

High School Opportunities

School Engagements and Support

- Meaningful participation (30% to 24% for 9th grade and 31% to 30% for 11th grade)

High School Opportunities

School Safety

- Been afraid of being beaten up (14% to 19% for 9th grade and 9% to 10% for 11th grade)

High School Opportunities

Mental Health

- Experienced chronic sadness/hopelessness (39% to 46% for 9th grade and 36% to 38% for 11th grade)
- Considered suicide (21% to 22% for 9th grade and 36% to 38% for 11th grade)

Middle School Opportunities

School Engagement and Supports

- Academic motivation (71% to 63%)
- Meaningful participation (26% to 25%)

Middle School Opportunities

School Safety

- Had mean rumors or lies spread about you (53% to 58%)

Middle School Opportunities

Mental Health

- Experienced chronic sadness/hopelessness (declined, but still too high at 33%)
- Considered suicide (17%)

Elementary School Opportunities

School Engagements and Supports

- Parent involvement in schooling (82% to 76%)

Elementary School Opportunities

School Safety

- Called bad names/target of mean jokes (56% to 60%)

Where do we go from here?

This work is ongoing!

- School-level Data Reports with professional development with WestEd
- MTSS interventions (All 3 sides of the pyramid)
- Data cycles to support MTSS
- School counselors doing classroom lessons and individual counseling
- Mini-surveys to check in on progress and make new plans
- Social-emotional curriculum implementation
- WEB, LINK Crew, Safe & Civil Schools
- Collaboration with community partners (Nexus, Behavioral Health, etc.)
- Re-assess in March 2020
